2025 ANNUAL REPORT

Field Hall Foundation is dedicated to improving the lives of older adults and their caregivers by supporting initiatives that enhance their health, safety, independence, and well-being. Through targeted grant-making, the Foundation strives to foster stronger, more resilient communities across Dutchess, Putnam, and Westchester Counties.

In 2025, the Field Hall Foundation awarded \$845,460 in grants to a diverse network of nonprofit organizations and local government agencies dedicated to improving the lives of older adults and their caregivers. A total of 65 grants were awarded, ranging from \$1,000 to \$60,000, including 18 full grants, 26 small grants, and 21 holiday grants.

Our grantmaking in 2025 reflected the Foundation's continued commitment to helping older adults remain safe, healthy, and independent in their communities. Through partnerships with nonprofit organizations and local agencies, we supported programs that addressed urgent needs while strengthening essential services for seniors and their caregivers.

Impact by Focus Area

Food Insecurity

Ensuring that older adults have reliable access to nutritious food remains a key priority. Grants supported food pantries and programs providing groceries and prepared meals to seniors, including home-delivered meals for homebound individuals. Funding also expanded medically tailored meal programs for seniors transitioning home from the hospital, supporting recovery and helping reduce the risk of readmission.

Home-Based Care Services

Helping seniors remain safely in their homes is central to the Foundation's mission. Grants supported home-based healthcare services for financially vulnerable older adults and provided essential household items for formerly homeless senior veterans establishing stable housing. The Foundation also funded music therapy-based respite programs offering comfort and support for seniors receiving end-of-life care.

Respite and Caregiver Support

Family caregivers play a vital role in helping older adults age in place. Grants supported respite care programs for families caring for loved ones with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias and helped establish a day program for seniors requiring enhanced supervision and care.

Safety and Security

Funding in this area supported home repairs and accessibility modifications for low-income senior homeowners, allowing them to remain safely in their homes. Additional grants strengthened programs that protect older adults from abuse and exploitation, including support for the Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program and services for victims of elder abuse.

Social Work and Case Management

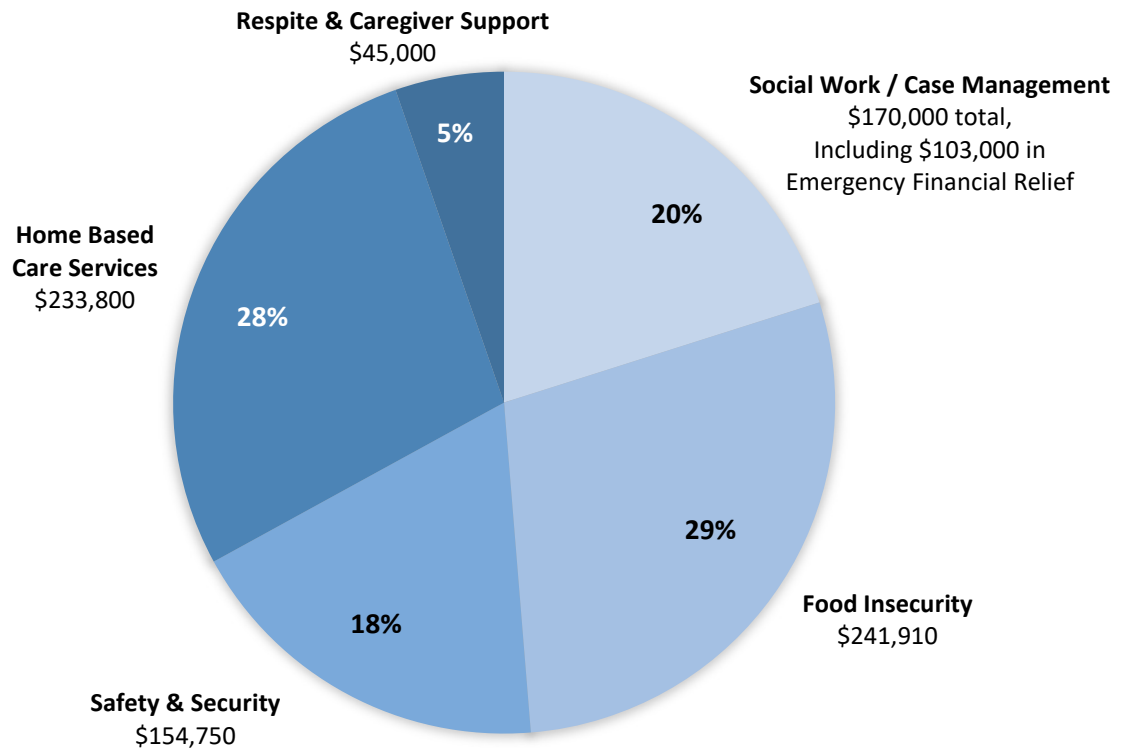
Social work and case management remain a cornerstone of the Foundation’s funding strategy. More than half of the grants in this category provided direct emergency financial assistance to seniors facing urgent needs. Additional programs supported formerly incarcerated older adults reentering the community and seniors raising grandchildren.

Transportation

Reliable transportation remains essential for older adults to access healthcare, food, and community connections. While no grants were awarded specifically for transportation initiatives in 2025, the Foundation recognizes the growing need in this area and anticipates supporting transportation-related programs in 2026.

The pie chart below shows the financial breakdown of grants in 2025, by focus area:

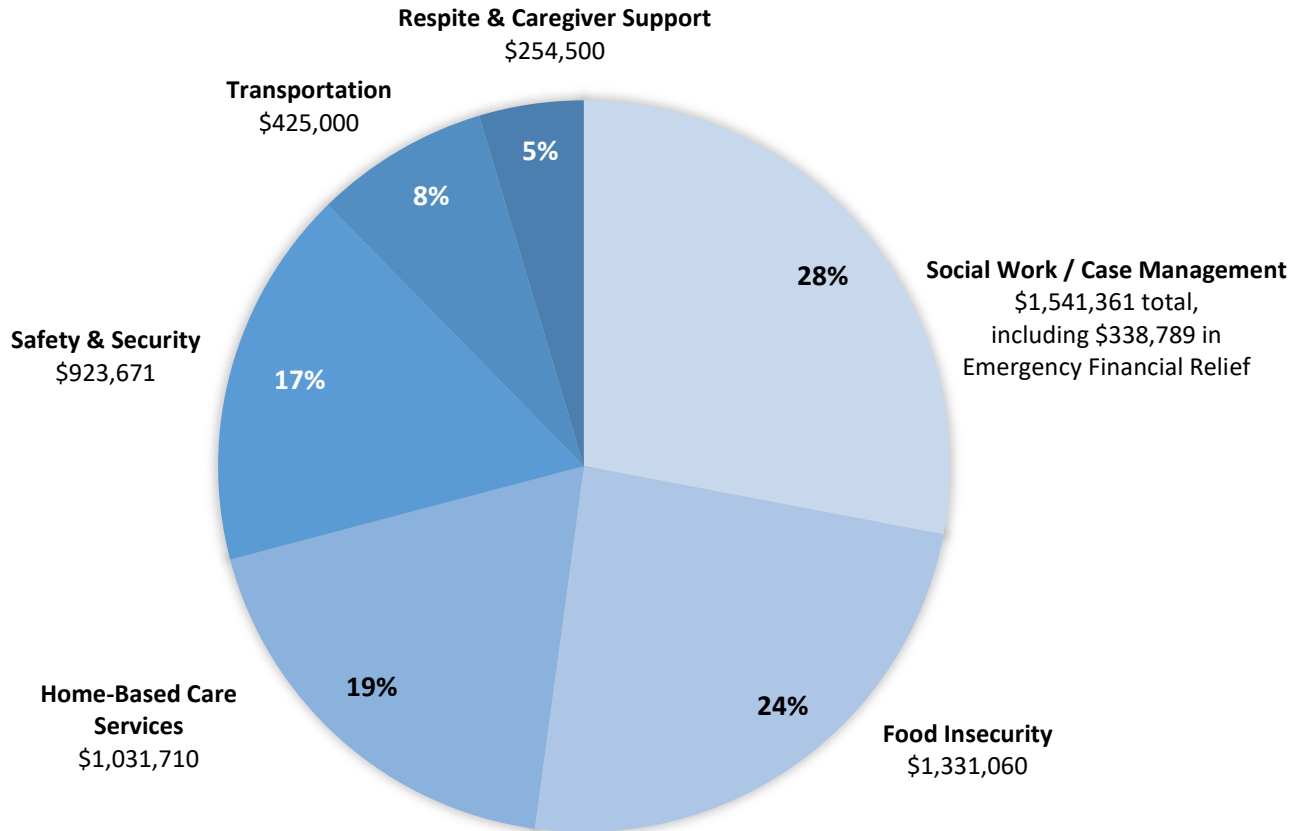


Total funding for 2025 was \$845,460.

Cumulative Grantmaking

Since inception in 2018, the Foundation has awarded \$5,500,000 through 365 grants, supporting 140 nonprofit organizations and government agencies. The grants encompass 106 full grants, 136 small grants, 30 emergency grants, and 93 holiday support grants.

The pie chart below shows the total distribution of funds to date, by focus area:



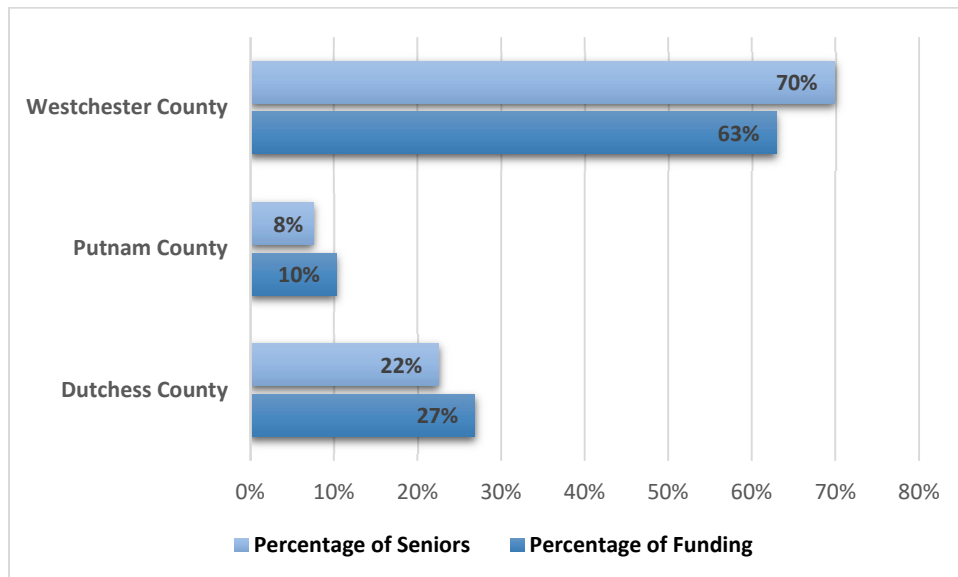
Total grants awarded since inception is \$5,507,302.

Funding by County

Each year, the Foundation evaluates the cumulative distribution of its grants in relation to the proportion of older adults residing in each county. This analysis helps ensure that funding is allocated equitably across the three counties we serve.

Overall, Dutchess and Putnam Counties have received a slightly higher share of funding relative to their senior populations. Westchester County, while home to the majority of the region's older adults, receives a somewhat smaller proportion of total grant funding. We believe this distribution reflects an equitable approach to meeting varying community needs across the region.

The chart below compares each county's cumulative grant funding with its share of the senior population.



County Highlights:

- Dutchess County represents 22% of the region's senior population and receives 27% of total funding, supporting approximately 80,000 older adults. Total grants awarded: \$1,478,685.
- Putnam County accounts for 8% of the senior population and receives 10% of total funding, serving approximately 26,900 older adults. Total grants awarded: \$565,450.
- Westchester County is home to 70% of the senior population and receives 63% of total funding, supporting approximately 248,600 older adults. Total grants awarded: \$3,463,167.

Looking Ahead to 2026

As of December 31, 2025, the Foundation’s endowment totaled approximately \$24.6 million. Based on current projections, we anticipate awarding approximately \$1,175,000 in grants in 2026. We will continue to actively monitor portfolio performance and adjust our grantmaking as needed to ensure long-term sustainability and impact.

In the coming year, the Foundation plans to expand support for programs addressing transportation needs, a critical barrier to independence and well-being for many older adults. We also expect to increase funding for emergency financial assistance, recognizing the growing number of seniors facing urgent and unforeseen hardships.

Looking ahead, the nonprofit organizations we support will continue to operate in a complex and uncertain environment. Rising demand for services, constrained resources, and broader economic pressures are creating ongoing challenges across the sector. In response, the Foundation remains committed to staying informed and responsive, ensuring that our grantmaking reflects the evolving needs of seniors and the organizations that serve them throughout our region.
